# Blue Box Program Transition

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## Regulatory Framework

- 1994 Ontario Reg 101/94 obligated municipal Blue Box programs
- 2002 Waste Diversion Act established concept of producer responsibility
- 2003 Blue Box Program Plan (BBPP) outlines how the program operates
- 2016 Waste-Free Ontario Act enacted two other acts:
  - Waste Diversion Transition Act → to wind up old programs
  - Resource Recovery and Circular Economy Act → framework for full producer responsibility (FPR)

### Regulatory Framework (con't)

- 2017 an amended Blue Box Program Plan (a-BBPP) was proposed
  - There was extensive consultation
  - A final proposal was never submitted
- June 2019 Province appoints Special Advisor
- July 2019 Special Advisor recommended:
  - Transition Blue Box Program to FPR between 2023 and 2025
  - Producers to establish collection and processing system
  - No obligation to use municipal services
  - Excludes Industrial, Commercial & Institutional (IC&I) waste
  - Material specific, progressive, high targets
- August 2019 Ministry announces program transition


- operate individual Blue Box programs

### Blue Box Program Plan (BBPP)

- shared responsibility program


### **Future Program**

- Multiple producer organizations are possible
- Resource Productivity & Recovery Authority (RPRA) strictly an enforcement agency
- Producers will operate the Blue Box program
- Regulations will define outcomes



### Key Elements of an IPR Regulation

- Definition and scope of designated materials
- Collection and accessibility requirements
- Targets
- Transition process
- Definition of the responsible producer
- Registration, reporting and record-keeping requirements
- Audit requirements








### Preparation

- Producers will prepare to assume control and operation of system
  - Establish services to meet Regulation requirements
  - Collection, transfer, transportation, processing, marketing
  - Contracting with service providers (including municipalities)



### **Transition**

- One third will transition each year
- Municipalities will need to decide if they will:
  - Continue as a service provider to the producers;
  - Turn the program over to the producers to operate; or
  - Continue to operate an independent and unfunded program



### When to transition?

- Council will need to determine preferred transition date
- Entire program transfers simultaneously
- Transition process is undefined

# Should I stay or should I go?

#### **Remain in Service Provision**

- It means becoming a contracted service provider
- Price paid and conditions are negotiated
- May require different transition date than desired
- Know your system costs
- Know your bargaining position

#### **Exit Blue Box Service Provision**

- Consider how other waste services will be integrated with producer BB system
- Review by-laws to ensure BB system runs appropriately in your community
- Requires close cooperation with producers to ensure a successful transition


### Your next step: Prepare a Transition Plan

- By June 30, 2020, AMO is asking councils to pass a resolution:
  - Preferred transition date
  - Interest in continuing to provide services
  - Key contacts
- Considerations:
  - Existing contracts
  - Capital assets
  - Staff
  - Customer service



## Challenges

- Transition mechanism is undefined
- Regulation is yet to be developed
- Service issues with producer programs
- Potential for delays in transition process
- Compensation level is unknown




### Lessons Learned from Other Programs

- Many municipalities underestimated their actual operating costs
- Most programs will not get their costs covered by staying in
- Under-performing programs face penalties
- Budget for communications with the public
- Need to plan to manage program components that the producers aren't obligated to manage

# Actions other municipalities are taking

- Negotiating strategic partnerships
- Amending contract language
- Reviewing current operations, assessing costs
